GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

ENTRIES

*****Please be aware, all Howe Sound Music Festival Participants give HSMF permission to publicize their names and photos in the media, including the website.**

- 1) Copies of the Syllabus and entry forms may be obtained by contacting Veronica McPhee, Executive Director and from the website at **www.musicfestivalweb.com/hsmf**
- 2) The Executive Director reserves the right to redirect entries to a more appropriate class. Teachers will be notified of these changes.
- 3) Each student may enter only once in each category. **PLEASE BE SURE TO READ THE SYLLABUS CAREFULLY, AS THE WEBSITE WILL ALLOW YOU TO ENTER CLASSES THAT ARE NOT NECESSARILY AVAILABLE TO YOUR GRADE LEVEL/AGE.** For example, Level 1 and 2 Piano are eligible for Baroque OR Classical choices, not both.
- 4) Entrants repeating a grade in successive years must change their selection. Gold Certificate winners may not enter the same level/class the following year(s) with the exception of Grades 8, 9, 10, 11 & Honours which may be entered for two years.
- 5) Participants falling in the Adult category of 21 years and over will have the option of performing in the class of which it falls. For example if the adult is playing a Level 10 Sonata, they would have the option of playing during class 2224 receiving a written & verbal adjudication along with their Gold, Silver, Bronze or Participation Certificate. However rule #61), they could not be nominated for any Scholarships.

ELIGIBILITY

- 6) All Piano & Vocal Festival classes shall be open to students who currently reside in the Howe Sound Corridor – Britannia Beach through to Pemberton.
 - i. International Students residing with local Homestay families for a 10 month school term are considered eligible students. Homestay parent must sign the registration form – not the teacher.
 - ii. These students ARE therefore eligible to be considered for scholarships and Provincial recommendation.
- 7) *** By request only, North Vancouver piano & vocal students studying with a North Vancouver music teacher may enter the Howe Sound Music Festival with the understanding they are not eligible for any scholarships. They will receive an appropriate Gold, Silver, Bronze certificate. Gold recipients will not perform at the Highlights concert.*
- 8) All entrants must be of amateur status (defined as those persons whose principal income is not derived from musical services).
- 9) There is a maximum age restriction for being recommended to the Provincial Music Festival. The age limit for both Vocal and Piano is 28 years and under **(Age of competitors is determined as of December 31st before the upcoming Provincial Festival)**.
- 10) Participants may enter only one level on the same instrument. In duet classes, this rule applies only to the participant at the higher level. Participants at the lower level may still compete as a solo performer in the classes appropriate for their level even if this differs from the duet class entered. (For example, if a Level 1 and Level 3 student are playing a piano duet together, they must enter the Level 3 Piano Duet Class 2353. In the case of Vocal Duets, the pair must enter the appropriate class for the older entrant.)
- 11) No individual shall be allowed to participate in more than one entry in any solo class. Individual members of duets may perform with more than one entry, however, not in the same age class and no repetition of repertoire will be permitted. No entry may compete against itself.
- 12) Substitutes shall be allowed in duets, only in cases of sickness or for other valid reasons and be subject to approval by the Festival Director. If a solo participant is unable to perform no one may take his/her place.

PIECE SELECTION

- 13) All solo selections are OWN CHOICE.
 - i. Piano pieces may be taken from any current Royal Conservatory of Music and current Western Board of Music books. Please refer to the piano guidelines for recognized editions.
- 14) REPEATS: Repeats need not be observed, with the exception of Da Capo and Del Segno al Fine or as specifically stated otherwise.

PERFORMANCE

Please note: the Howe Sound Music Festival is very fortunate to be able to use two very fine instruments in both Whistler and Squamish. Please ensure that your hands are clean before piano performances and accompaniments. Thank you for your co-operation.

- 15) Performers must provide the Adjudicator with an original copy of the score being performed. **Photocopies or absent scores may result in disqualification.**
The student may be asked NOT to perform. At the discretion of the Adjudicator, performances will result in an adjudication and participation certificate.
Performers are requested to number the measures in the score used by the adjudicator.
- 16) Performers are encouraged to memorize their music. Please see "Certificates" for the requirements in order to receive a "Gold" certificate.
- 17) Late arrivals that are not present when they are called upon to perform will be called again at the end of the class performances. If still not present, the entrant will be considered a no-show, and will not be able to play at any later time.
Students are required to be present 30 min. ahead of scheduled time in case classes are running early and to facilitate punctual session starts.
- 18) At no time may a participant in a piano class play on the Festival piano(s) outside of an actual class performance. Likewise, Voice participants are not allowed to rehearse (including warm-ups) at Festival venues.
- 19) Absolute silence must be maintained during all performances. Teachers are asked to explain this rule to all students and parents who may not be aware of its importance.
- 20) Recording complete Festival classes and the Highlights Concert by still and/or video cameras is NOT allowed. If parents wish, they may record their child's performance ONLY. Adjudicator comments may NOT be recorded. Teachers, please make your parents aware of this.
- 21) Formal dress is not required, but it would be appreciated if appropriate attire is worn, i.e. no torn or sloppy T-Shirts or jeans.

BILL 60 - COPYRIGHT LAWS

- 22) Please note: Stringent laws with respect to copyright were passed as law through Bill 60 in 1989. Anyone producing a photocopy for the adjudicator or accompanist without a copy of the written permission letter from the publisher may result in disqualification. At the discretion of the Adjudicator, when performances are allowed, they will result in a participation certificate only. If a contestant does choose music that is out of print or difficult to acquire, written permission from the publisher can be obtained to have the music copied. Please be aware that publishing firms out of business have generally transferred their copyright to other firms.

ENTRY FORMS / FEES / DEADLINE / PROGRAMS

- 23) Teachers, Parents, or Students must submit entries on-line at www.musicfestivalweb.com/hsmf/registration. The copy of the registration and entry fees must be mailed to Howe Sound Music Festival c/o Howe Sound Performing Arts Association, PO Box 365, Garibaldi Highlands, BC, V0N 1T0, and postmarked by the deadline outlined in the current syllabus. Failure to receive payment by the deadline will result in a late entry and will not be processed.
- a) NOTE: Please check prior to entry submission there are no personal scheduling conflicts during Festival time. Special requests can be made during online registration and will try to be accommodated by HSMF. The Festival cannot make changes or refunds for the above reasons or any reason other than Festival error, class cancelled by the Festival, or medical emergency.
- 24) Entry fees cannot be refunded, except under circumstances where the entry is rejected by the Festival.
- 25) Requests to change the selected works after the entry has been received by the Festival Director may result in their status being changed to participation only. Final decision will be made by the Festival Director.
- 26) Teachers will be charged for their copy of the Festival Program. It is required that each entrant family must also purchased a copy of the Program. There will be a limited amount of extra programs available.
- 27) Late entries will not be accepted.

FESTIVAL SPECTATOR PASS

46) Passes are available at the door of each class. Please see the current addendum for prices.

VOLUNTEERS

47) As the Festival is a co-operative venture for the benefit of students and teachers, we are asking that teachers be responsible for contributing their time for at least one session. When possible, Desk Monitors will be filled by a non-teacher, non-parent. Some of the other duties are: Door Monitors (Inside & Out), and Adjudicator Hospitality, Room Setup, Highlights Concert Coordinator, Distribution of Programs.

48) In appreciation of one's volunteer support during the festival, any volunteer (teacher or parent) providing a minimum of 4 hours volunteer time, outside of the Highlights Concert, will receive a complimentary Festival pass.

49) Persons acting as the Desk Monitors may not repeat or reveal to anyone the particular marks or comments from the Adjudicator that they have read or overheard. Everything they see and do at the desk is confidential.

50) In fairness to the Adjudicator, it is imperative that all teachers refrain from identifying by word or action whom their students are, and from making comments or suggestions to an Adjudicator, either before or during the Festival, that may be interpreted as an attempt to influence the adjudication in any way.

CANCELLATIONS / CHANGES

51) In the case of illness or injury to an entrant, a refund of fees will be made on presentation of a medical certificate. If a class is cancelled by the Executive Director, the fee will be refunded in full.

52) Once the program has gone to print there can be NO changes in the schedule.

53) Teachers may receive constructive feedback from parents and forward them to the appropriate Discipline Coordinator.

CERTIFICATES

54) All participating students will be awarded a certificate based on the Adjudicator's assessment of their performances. The categories are:

a) Gold (86 % and up – Memorized Performance)

b) Silver (80 – 85%)

c) Bronze (76 – 79%)

d) Participation (under 75%)

e) Marks are not given out at the Festival

f) Certificates will not be publicly awarded but will be included with the adjudication sheet in the returned copy of the student's musical score. At the discretion of the Adjudicator, Participation certificates will be awarded to students who present a photocopied score.

- 55) The Adjudicators' decisions are final; Adjudicators will not enter into any discussion with teachers, students or parents regarding their decisions.
- 56) No marks will be publicly recorded or announced.

HIGHLIGHTS CONCERT

- 57) **All Piano and Vocal participants who have received a Gold performance during the Festival are invited to perform that selection at the Highlights Concert. In cases where a student receives more than one Gold, the student may select one (1) piece, with input from the Adjudicator.**
- 58) All Festival Participants are invited to attend the Pre-concert reception and the Highlights Concert FREE OF CHARGE. Please bring Competitor Card for proof of free entry. Children under the age of twelve (12) must be accompanied by a paying adult.
- 59) All Scholarship Awards will be presented at the Highlights Concert. The Highlights Concert is open to the public.
- 60) Awards at the Highlights Concert are in the form Scholarships. Medals are no longer awarded.
- 61) AN ENTRANT MAY NOT WIN THE SAME SCHOLARSHIP MORE THAN TWO CONSECUTIVE YEARS.
- 62) Winners in duet classes may compete for the same award in the ensuing year only if each individual has advanced one level in solo competition
- 63) Classes marked with an (E) are not eligible for Provincial Music Festival categories.
- 64) Adjudicators are knowledgeable of Provincial standards and have the interest of the student in mind. It should be noted that Adjudicators might decide NOT to recommend students to the Provincial Festival in spite of the existence of qualifying marks.
- 65) The requirements for being considered for a piano or vocal solo award (scholarship) are:
- i. The student must perform in at least TWO solo classes in the Festival and be awarded at least one gold certificate therein
 - ii. See Notes under Scholarship heading.
- 66) The requirements for being considered for a piano or vocal duet award (scholarship) are:
- i. One Duet partner must have entered TWO solo classes to be eligible for a duet scholarship.
 - ii. See Notes under Scholarship heading.

MEDALS

NOTE: Medals will no longer be awarded for the Howe Sound Music Festival. Performances at the Highlights Concert will be a celebration of success and not a venue for competition.

SCHOLARSHIPS

NOTE: Scholarships are awarded to students based on their performance in their scheduled classes throughout the festival. Announcements are made at the Highlights Concert.

In order to be eligible for a Scholarship, the student must have performed in at least two (2) eligible classes. Please note that classes marked with (E) or NOT eligible for scholarships or Provincial Music Festival classes.

Please see the Addendum, which outlines all the scholarships available for the current festival year.

Anyone wishing to donate funds towards the scholarship program can do so by contacting the Executive Director, Veronica McPhee.

PROVINCIAL FESTIVAL

Effective October 2003, the Howe Sound Music Festival is now affiliated with Performing Arts BC. Following the piano & voice segments the Adjudicators will make recommendations.

PROVINCIAL CLASSES

Performing Arts BC is the umbrella organization which annually mounts the Provincial Festival. Please refer to the current addendum which specifies the yearly location of the Provincials. The goal is to find a location that creates an 'Olympic Village' atmosphere: a centralized location with participants living in residence on campus.

Performing Arts BC is responsible for producing the Provincial Festival which provides competition at the Provincial level. It also provides musicians the opportunity to qualify for the National Festival of Music Competition.

A. Guidelines Regarding the Provincial Festival

Provincial level competitions are open to all eligible competitors, who at the local Festival:

- Receive an adjudicator's recommendation
- Are within or below the appropriate age limit for the class
- Are performing to the criteria set in the Provincial Syllabus, obtaining a mark of 86 or more (which is a Gold Performance at HSMF)
- Have entered at least TWO or more solo classes for their field of music at the local level. Please note: classes marked with (E) do NOT qualify for Provincial Music Festival classes.
- Conform to the local Festival definition of geographic eligibility

- Participants recommended from a specific class must prepare to perform a contrasting 2nd piece, of the same level. Additional information required by participants will be provided by HSMF, or visit the website at www.performingartsbc.ca/Syllabus.pdf

B. Adjudicator Recommendations

1. Adjudicators are knowledgeable of Provincial standards and have the interest of the student in mind. It should be noted that Adjudicators may decide NOT to recommend students to the provincial Festival in spite of the existence of qualifying marks.
2. The local Festival Adjudicator is the ONLY Person authorized to recommend competitors to the Provincial Festival. The Adjudicator must sign the Provincial Entry Form.

1. Mandatory in all classes at Provincial and National levels.

Provincial Location: Please refer to the annual addendum or the festival program which indicates the location. The Howe Sound Music Festival will cover the entry fees

associated with attending the Provincial Festival but all travel and extra incidentals are to be paid by the participant.

VOCAL NOTES AND REGULATIONS

Please note that participants must provide original music for the use of the adjudicator for ALL Festival classes. Participants are requested to number the measures for use by the adjudicator. Accompanists, where used, are required to use original music for ALL Festival classes. If a participant chooses music that is out of print or difficult to acquire, a copy of the written permission letter from the publisher must be obtained to have the music copied for the adjudicator and accompanist. This letter must be provided at the time of the performance. **Failure to provide one may result in not being allowed to perform.**

VOCAL REGULATIONS:

1. Vocal Participants should bring their own accompanists.
2. Pre-recorded accompaniment is not permitted in any music class.
3. In Solo Classes, if a participant for some reason cannot perform, he/she may NOT be replaced by another participant. Should a regular member of a Trio, Quartet, Chamber or Ensemble Class be unable to perform, ONE substitution will be permitted.
4. If a performer receives a Gold Certificate in the Modern Folk/Popular category, he/she must have performed in at least one Prov. Festival eligible class (such as Folk, Sacred, Own Choice, etc.) to be eligible for a classical Scholarship or recommendation to the Provincial Music Festival.
5. Competitors entering Adult Vocal Sections: Class A [Advanced], Open, or Adult Beginner, may not enter Intermediate or Junior Sections. High standards of musical choice will be taken into consideration in all classes.

FOLK SONG - To include Folk Songs, Ballads, Spirituals, and Sea Chanties. The selection may be in any language. If the language is other than English, a translation must be provided with the music. Traditional Folk Songs or Ballads of any nationality are those where the original composer is unknown, even if a modern composer has recently arranged the song. Contemporary Folk Songs or Ballads of any nationality are those written by known composers in the above style. [Please see Modern Folk Song definition below for comparison.] Songs may be sung in original or language or English translation.

(E) MODERN FOLK/POPULAR MUSIC - Own choice of contemporary song in the pop idiom.

MODERN FOLK: These songs are written similar to a traditional style, but the composer is known, for example, Joan Baez, Gordon Lightfoot, or Stan Rodgers. **POPULAR MUSIC** includes rock, Christian rock, jazz, blues, or ragtime. The selection may be in any language. If other than English, a translation must be submitted with the music. May also be an original composition NOT self-accompanied. **In the case of an original composition, a hand written or computerized copy of the score (including melody line, accompaniment, and lyrics) must be provided.** Failure to provide a score will result in Adjudication only.

(E) OWN COMPOSITION VOCAL SELECTION - Must be a new work composed by the person or persons performing it. It must be **SELF-ACCOMPANIED**, not to exceed four (4) minutes. A hand written or computerized copy of the score (including melody line, accompaniment, and lyrics) must be provided. Failure to provide a score will result in Adjudication only.

(E) CONCERT CLASS - Own choice of three (3) pieces by one composer OR period. The purpose of this class is to provide an opportunity for students to prepare and perform a "set" as it might appear in a concert. Students are encouraged to find unifying features in the set, yet still provide contrast in mood, tempo, etc. Time limit: 20 minutes.

(E) RECITAL GROUP - Own choice of three (3) pieces of own choice chosen for contrast in period, style, and mood, with no composer being used more than once. Participants are encouraged to present a varied program in the time allotted. The purpose of this class is to provide an opportunity for students to prepare and perform a mini-recital in public. Time limit: 20 minutes.

(E) - Vocal Solo, Adult Beginner: Own selection, own choice.

NOTE: The above class is restricted to adults, aged 21 and older from a Beginner level, who wish to perform in a festival setting. Adult students aged 21-33 of an advanced level should register in Grade A in the applicable class title. Mature students aged 21 and older of an Intermediate level and adult students aged 33 and over of an Advanced level should register in the appropriate class in the Open age category. Performances will be evaluated in accordance with the standard appropriate for the level of study. Classes marked with (E) are excluded from Provincial Music Festival classes.

VOCAL ENSEMBLE

MUSICAL THEATRE

Musical Theatre selections must be taken from a stage show or motion picture (not from a TV Production). A Musical is defined by having a plot developed by dialogue interspersed with songs and often containing dances. The "Broadway Musical" is representative of this genre. Costumes and choreography are encouraged in Musical Theatre classes. One prop only may be used (in addition to a single chair). Selections from animated musical productions are acceptable only for 14 years and under.

RECOGNIZED SYLLABUS:

The term "recognized" syllabus is used to refer to the most recent editions of the Royal Conservatory of Music (2009) or Conservatory Canada (2006) Piano Syllabi.

NOTES:

- 1) Levels 1 -11 roughly correspond to Levels 1 - 11 Royal Conservatory of Music or Western Board.
- 2) Movements of Sonatas, Sonatinas, or Concerti will NOT be permitted for use in "Own Choice" classes, except when they do not fit into an existing class.
- 3) Rule # 61) - Classes marked with (E) are excluded from Provincial Music Festival categories.
- 4) If a performer receives a Gold Certificate in the RCM Pop Category, he/she must have performed in at least one other class to be eligible for a Scholarship.

PIANO SOLO CLASSES
